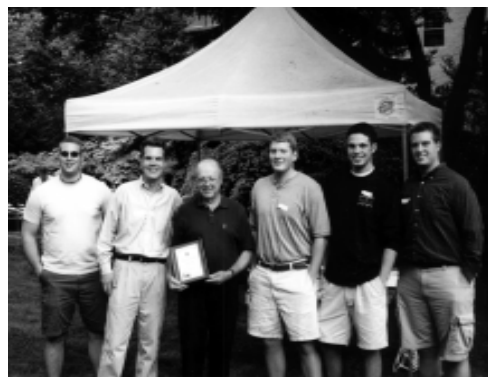

The Road Less Traveled . . .

The Reverend Ken Klingerman '54

In the last issue of *The Delta Penn*, we centered the spotlight on those brothers that had chosen a path of teaching and/or preaching religion. At the time the Spring 2001 issue went to print, we had been unable to contact the Rev. Ken Klingerman '54 who has been working diligently with various churches and organizations for nearly 50 years.

Ken Klingerman grew up in a small borough in northeastern Pennsylvania called Jeddo. Placed in the mountains of Pennsylvania, Ken came to appreciate the balance of nature and the vastness of the heavens. He also began to wonder how lives became unbalanced and what could be done about it.

An owner of a coal company established a school which would become a boys high school in 1879 named The Mining & Mechanical Institute. In the 1940s it was developed more as a "Prep School." Ken did so well at the school that he was granted a full tuition scholarship to Penn. Since his family did not have the financial means to send him to college, this scholarship was the answer to his prayers.

Ken majored in modern European history and graduated in 1954. After Penn, he attended Eden Theological Seminary and earned a degree in systematic theology in 1958. In September 1957, he married Diane and went on to have four children and six grandchildren.

He remained in the St. Louis Association of the United Church of Christ (UCC) the entire time. In June of 1955, he began working with Fellowship Center Neighborhood House while attending seminary and fulfilling other field work assignments. In 1958, he was ordained with the title of Minister of Social Welfare. Following Eden, he enrolled at Washington University in St. Louis and in 1960 received a Master's Degree in Social Work and subsequently began an additional neighborhood center as the Program Director.

The War on Poverty and the Great Society in the '60s began placing limitations on the ministry whenever governmental money was received. Ken concluded by 1966 that he did not want the position of ministry to be limited or restricted, so he entered a new expression of ministry titled "Minister Among" the Northside Six UCC Churches. For Ken, this was a wonderful arrangement: he was not over the individual churches but rather free to operate as the "Minister Among" with the assignment of helping these churches decide their future ministry. Twelve additional established UCC churches then became the Northside Eighteen Churches under Ken's watchful eye. After eight years, Ken felt the mission of his current role was complete, so he began a full-time ministry as an associate minister of

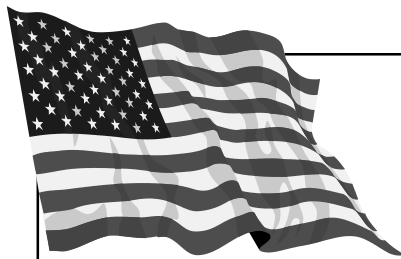
The Meaning of Brotherhood

Henry Pope '43 Honored At National Conclave

Henry Pope '43 was honored in Washington, D.C., this August by the national fraternity at Sigma Phi Epsilon's Centennial Conclave Celebration.

Henry's actions during World War II have been noted numerous times to Penn Delta brothers through this newsletter. However, the National Fraternity in Richmond found out about these actions and decided to honor Henry with the fraternity's highest award for Brotherly Love — The Honor of Philias.

Below is the text from the award presentation made by the SigEp Educational Foundation before a group of more than 1,600 brothers representing chapters from all over the country on August 18, 2001.

Virtue is the knowledge that we are interdependent, that we belong to one another, that the welfare of each depends ultimately on the welfare of the other.

Brotherly Love is the act of virtue, of actively doing something with the knowledge of virtue.

For Sigma Phi Epsilon, Brotherly Love is the essence of our brotherhood. The ancient Greeks considered love of family, love of mate, love of objects to be important and identifiable. However, they carefully identified the love of friend or "brother" as special and called it PHILIAS.

Sigma Phi Epsilon's Honor of Philias honors a person or group who has, in a unique, worthy, and unselfish way, accomplished an act of love and affection that brings to life the cardinal principal of brotherly love.

Established by past Grand President Jack Wheeler and his wife, Kate, as an endowment of the Sigma Phi Epsilon Educational Foundation, the Honor of Philias has been presented at each conclave since 1989. The Fraternity's National Board of Directors and the Educational Foundation's Board of Trustees select the honoree jointly.

The permanent symbol of this honor is on display at Zollinger House, the Fraternity's headquarters, with the names of the recipients permanently engraved. A replica of the permanent symbol is presented to each honoree.

Today we recognize a brother in Sigma Phi Epsilon who has demonstrated Brotherly Love in an uncommon

way, not expecting recognition, awards or attention. He is a living example for all brothers in Sigma Phi Epsilon and for the communities in which we live. Grand President Bill Tragos and Foundation Chairman "H" Clark will make the presentation.

Our brother being recognized today was unable to serve during World War II because of a medical deferment. Not one to sit on the sidelines during the war, our Brother served his chapter brothers and the war effort by maintaining contact with his chapter brothers all over the globe. He wrote the 75 Penn Delta Chapter Brothers serving in the armed forces and persisted until they wrote back. The responses were the basis for a monthly newsletter, The Delta Pen, which carried news of all the brothers,

their whereabouts and exploits.

During the war years, the brother we honor today wrote and distributed 27 issues of The Delta Pen and received more than 700 letters from brothers serving during the war. Each issue of The Delta Pen was only a few pages long, but the brothers overseas were cheered on by the fact that they weren't alone or forgotten.

There were sad times when letters stopped coming from the five Brothers who were killed in action. One of those was our recipient's little brother who was missing in action in Italy and pronounced dead by the Army in 1945. In addition to the five deceased brothers, many others were injured during combat.

Following the war, the Pennsylvania Delta Chapter held a homecoming celebration, and nearly 300 people gathered to celebrate the end of the war and the bond that linked them together during their time away— the

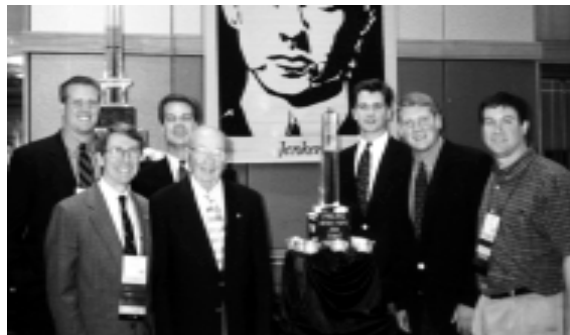
bond that this brother kept alive.

Our Honor of Philias recipient, Brother Henry A. Pope, Jr., University of Pennsylvania, Pennsylvania Delta Chapter, 1943, has put together a collection of the 27 issues of The Delta Pen as well as over 700 original letters that he received during the war from SigEp brothers. And his legacy is that The Delta Pen is still

With a lot of luck and many close calls, all of the undergraduates, their immediate families and friends, are safe and healthy.

We are now focusing our efforts to help with the disaster relief in New York and Washington. Many brothers have given blood on campus and Philanthropy Chair Max Greenberg '04 is currently in contact with the Red Cross to obtain information about individual volunteering. We are also in the process of organizing a barbecue in our parking lot. We are hoping to get food donations from a local grocery store, advertise around campus and within the IFC and Panhel, charge a few dollars at the gate, and give all proceeds to the Red Cross Disaster Relief Fund. Moreover, we are going to use our annual Reggae Party as a medium to raise money from sponsors to give to charity.

If any alumni are in the Philadelphia area, feel free to stop by the chapter house and say hello. We hope to see all of you at Homecoming on November 3rd.

The Reverend Ken Klingerman '54

Salem Church in Florissant, MO, outside St. Louis. By 1979 he had become the senior pastor and stayed with this church until his retirement in 1998. Ken feels the most rewarding part of his career in all of the aspects of his ministries has been, and continues to be, a close living relationship with his faith and in sharing that faith with others.

Since his retirement in 1998, Ken and his wife have refreshed and/or restored various rooms in their home. And since there is no such thing as a fully retired minister, Ken accepted a part-time position, Pastor of Congregational

Care, at another congregation in the spring of 2000.

As for Penn Delta, Ken got to know a number of the brothers and he felt at home. Some of his fondest memories include spending relaxed time after dinner shooting pool, serving as bartender on Saturday events, being the chaplain, and being the Pledge Director/Educator during his senior year. To help defray the cost of meals and membership to SigEp, Ken also worked washing lunch and dinner dishes in the kitchen with Mr. Marshall every Monday through Saturday during the school year.

When we asked Ken, what advice he would have for someone considering the ministry, he answered, "The advice I would give someone considering serving in a religious organization is (1) What is your motivation? If a person searches out bone-honest answers to at least these questions, that person should expect to live a meaningful purposeful expression of ministry." 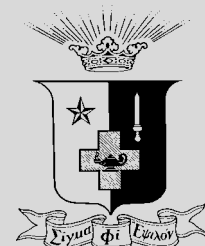
