Capital Campaign Kicks Off at NYC Dinner

\$645,950 Pledged So Far!

Following several months of behind-the-scenes preparations, administrative tasks and soliciting selected prospects, One Hundred Years of Excellence, A Vision for Our Second Century: The Campaign for Sigma

Phi Epsilon at the University of Pennsylvania formally kicked off at the 17th annual Raymond C. McCron Dinner at the Penn Club in New York City on April 7, 2005.

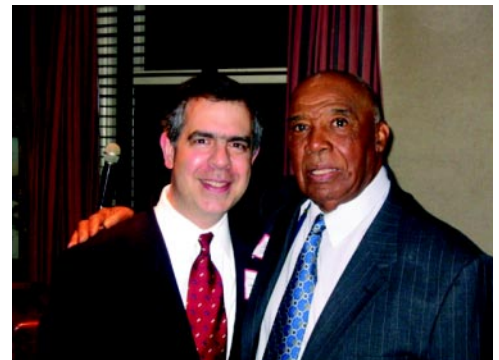
Nearly \$650,000 in gifts and pledges were announced as having been received to date. Penn Delta Foundation president and campaign co-chair **Brett Danko '90** spoke about the campaign and this auspicious start to raising enough

funding to substantially renovate the Penn Delta chapter house at 4028 Walnut Street.

This year the NYC dinner was a terrific, as well as timely, opportunity to announce to those present and, by way of this issue of *The Delta Penn*, the entire community of SigEps at Penn, that we have achieved initial success in our capital campaign, and we are well on our way toward our fundraising goal. It was also the culmination of more than a year of capital campaign feasibility studies, initial planning and selected visits with Penn Delta alumni who have supported the chapter over the years. The response so far has been most encouraging in this early stage of what will be a two-year fundraising campaign.

A crowd of more than 60 Penn Delta alumni, undergraduates and friends were on hand to

hear the good news of the campaign's formal and public launching. It is the first capital campaign for Penn Delta since the early 1990s. Those assembled applauded the news that \$645,950 had already been pledged to the campaign on our way to raising \$1.5 million or more to fund the most extensive renovation to the SigEp chapter house since it was acquired in the 1970s.

Planned major house improvements include enclosing the courtyard to create more space in the basement as well as on the first floor, building an additional wing at the back of the house for more bedrooms, moving the parking lot entrance to the back of the property (Chancellor

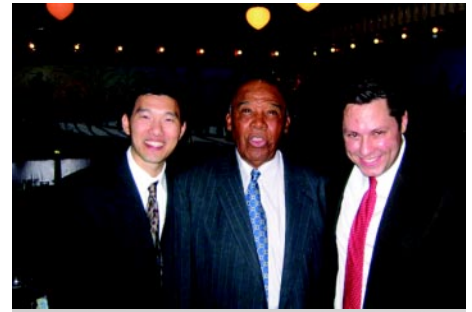
Street), and major upgrades to the infrastructure of the 106-year-old house such as electrical, HVAC and plumbing. Construction is scheduled to begin in the summer of 2007. **Due to numerous safety-code considerations enacted throughout the last decade, these upgrades are essential to a safe living environment and are required not only by Penn but by the state of Pennsylvania.**

Gifts to the campaign will be deposited in a specially designated account for Sigma Phi Epsilon at the University of Pennsylvania. The arrangement allows:

- All gifts to be tax deductible for donors.
- All gifts to qualify for applicable corporate matching gifts programs for those alumni whose companies have such programs.
- Most pledges to be made over multiple years, up to a maximum of five years.
- Numerous naming opportunities.

Several members of the capital campaign committee, all of whom have made monetary pledges, were in attendance at the dinner to help campaign co-chair **Brett Danko** proclaim the campaign's formal kickoff. They included **David Lloyd '74, Wayne Palladino '80, Rich Pzena '80, John Venusti '89, Nelson Yu '93** and **Steve Gresdo '96.**

Shipwreck Diver Doug Roberts Featured in Bestselling Book

Brother **Doug Roberts '83** was part of the initial group, a daring team that risked their lives with every dive. The perils and exhilaration they experienced are chronicled throughout the book in vivid detail.

While there are as many as 10 million certified scuba divers in the U.S., only a few hundred dive deeper than 100 feet for shipwrecks. For these very few, the sport is an addiction. It has tested each of them against treacherous currents, freezing water, depths that induce hallucinatory narcosis, and navigation through wreckage as perilous as any minefield. These divers push themselves to the limits and beyond, brushing against their own deaths in the rusting hulks of sunken, sometimes forgotten, ships.

During his mid- to late 20s, brother Roberts regularly subjected himself to such dangers by exploring U-869 as well as the famed Italian oceanliner the Andrea Doria that lies 240 feet beneath the sea in the frigid Atlantic Ocean. He also explored other Northeastern shipwrecks including the U.S.S. Oregon, U.S.S. San Diego, the Arundo, the Choapa and the Ayuroca. He is a member of the Explorers Club for his participation the U-869 expedition.

Doug became interested in diving after graduating from Penn. He became scuba-certified, and dove in shallow depths and to various shipwrecks in the warm Caribbean with other Penn Delta SigEps, namely **Howard Gitten '82** and **Kenny Meyers '83.**

However, only Doug sought out the challenge of deep shipwreck diving, one of the world's most dangerous sports. It is said that if a deep-wreck diver stays in the sport long enough, he will likely see another diver die, or come close to dying or die himself.

After the initial dives exploring the U-boat, Doug met his bride-to-be and opted to stop pursuing this death-defying sport. He still dives for pleasure.

The film rights to *Shadow Divers* have been purchased by Fox 2000, and brother Roberts has been doing several book signings throughout the United States while he is not busy operating his Web site businesses, www.smartcover.com and the soon to be launched www.channelcapitalresearch.com.

Remarkable Results: SigEp Plays Important Role in Building Integrity and Character

Some people in today's society may think it's old-fashioned to discuss morality and integrity, but the reality is that good morals, good manners and good behavior will never go out of style. On college campuses, fraternities and sororities offer a great foundation for developing these ideals.

While it must be acknowledged that some Greek organizations fall woefully short in this regard, and that many — maybe most — have experienced at least a few challenging incidents, the Greek system is still driven by values-based programs.

Learning about responsibility, honesty, courtesy, respect, justice, community service, philanthropy, academic achievement, cooperation, diversity and tolerance is simply part of what it means to go Greek. There are long-standing codes of conduct in place to uphold these cherished values, and new members are instilled with the importance of maintaining their organization's venerable traditions and good reputation.

Peer pressure of the right kind has a positive impact. Since the actions of each individual reflect on the group as a whole, members influence each other to do right. They encourage each other to strive for good grades and to contribute to the welfare of the group and the community, and they discipline those who step out of line.

In fact, far more behavioral guidance is evidenced in Greek houses than in the average dormitory or student-occupied apartment building, not just through peer pressure but also through the steadying influence of each chapter's board of directors, the codes of conduct endorsed by each organization's national office, the campus's interfraternity council and, most important, the active support of each chapter's alumni.

- Greeks often outperform the general student population in academics, with many Greek organizations mandating higher

grade averages from their members than the averages among the rest of the student population.

- Greeks far surpass every other student demographic group when it comes to community involvement. They raise untold millions of dollars for charitable organizations and annually donate millions of hours of their time to worthy causes of all kinds, from Big Brothers/Big Sisters to Habitat for Humanity to local food banks, and so many more.
- Greek organizations are also training grounds for leadership, teamwork, problem solving and time management. Through chapter leadership positions, undergraduates develop advanced human relations skills that will be invaluable to them throughout their lives, both in business and in their personal relationships.

Statistics from the North-American Interfraternity Conference reveal that nearly half of all U.S. presidents, 30 percent of members of Congress, 40 percent of U.S. Supreme Court justices and about 30 percent of Fortune 500 executives have Greek roots. How can two percent of the overall student population have become so dominant in public life? They have their character-building experiences in fraternities and sororities to thank for that.

From national headquarters to local chapters, Greek organizations demand that their undergraduate members be accountable, involved, hard-working and caring people. By providing nurturing environments with high behavioral expectations, fraternities and sororities are shaping the leaders and responsible citizens of the future.

The ongoing support of dedicated alumni is crucial to making it possible for us to continue providing these worthwhile opportunities for current and future generations of Greeks.
